Delegates to select from pre-defined colour coded statements what best describes the current situation in their countries and icons to visually represent availability of an integrated care plan.
 - Alternative to have a pinboard where delegates pin a colour that best represents the state of integrated care in their country.
- Option for the world map with the delegates' conclusions to be mirrored in a touch screen in the coffee area where delegates can explore the different types of integrated care systems around the world and get some new ideas to take home not currently budgeted for [would require CMLR approval onsite]
